School Description and Mission Statement

Located in the Pocket-Greenhaven area of South Sacramento, Martin Luther King, Jr. K-8 School offers parents and students the opportunity to complete middle school in an environment that maintains the connectedness established in grade school.

In addition to a strong academic program stressing reading, writing, and mathematics, students participate in after-school art classes, physical education, and a vocal music program. Over 150 computers allow students and staff the opportunity to access technology in every classroom as well as in a laboratory environment. Teachers are equipped with latest technology to utilize all of the components of our recent math, science and social science adoptions. Each classroom is equipped with a document viewer, LCD projector, and laptop as essential teaching tools connected to the internet. English Learners receive support in learning English through pull out and ELD instruction. Martin Luther King, Jr. K-8 School offers six different special education models to meet the needs of our students with IEPs including primary and intermediate autism classes as well as two specific SDC classes. Students from pre-school through 8th grade receive speech services five days a week. Our school psychologist is on site two days a week. Additionally, GATE students can opt to enroll in a multi-age full day class in both the primary and intermediate grades.

Parents may also select from a menu of optional extended day programs for their children. Courses in instrumental music, art, science, and athletics allow students to enrich their lives and expand their knowledge. Teachers also arrange opportunities for students to receive extra help in reading and math before or after school and during breaks.

A fee-based, district-sponsored day care program is also available to parents whose children attend K-6 classes at MLK. In addition, several family nights are offered throughout the school year including a Family Math Night, a Family Reading Night, an Ice Cream Social, Chili Cook-off, Family Movie Night, and a Spring Social as well as an evening for parents to view the annual Science Fair.

Parents play a key role at MLK. In addition to participation in an active PTA, the School Site Council (School Improvement Program), the English Learner Advisory Committee, the School Advisory Committee, and the GATE Parent Advisory Committee, parents can be seen daily working in classrooms, in the workroom, or on the yard. The PTA also holds fundraisers, which help support classroom and school needs and provide special opportunities for students. Many parents volunteer hundreds of hours a year to help make school activities successful.

Opportunities for Parental Involvement

Parents are welcome at anytime on the MLK campus. In addition to the PTA and various committees, many parents are involved daily in classrooms or in supervising the cafeteria and the yard. Parents also help organize special events and chaperone students on field trips. Kristi Morioka was the PTA President during 2009-10.

Month and year in which data were collected: August 2011

The main campus was built in 1988. This school has 30 permanent classrooms which include a multipurpose room, a library, and an administrative building.

The district takes great efforts to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional. District maintenance staff ensures that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good repair and working order are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used to ensure efficient service and that emergency repairs are given the highest priority. The district governing board has adopted cleaning standards for all the schools in the district. A summary of these standards is available at the school office, or at the district operations office. The principal works directly with the custodial staff to develop cleaning schedules to ensure a clean and safe school.

The State Legislature established the Deferred Maintenance Fund (DMF) in 1980 to assist districts in maintaining facilities and sites. The District has participated in the Deferred Maintenance Program since its inception. The program requires both the local district and the State of California to share equally in the cost of major deferred maintenance projects, with the maximum contribution from the State limited to approximately one-half of one percent of the District's General Fund and Adult Education Fund operating budgets. For fiscal years 2008-09 through 2012-13, the Deferred Maintenance Program has been included in the State's Tier III Flexibility Program. Therefore, DMF funds received by the District are deposited in the General Fund, and are unrestricted. Due to state budget cuts for 2010-11 these unrestricted funds have not been designated to deferred maintenance purposes. The funds were used as part of the Tier III recommendations approved by the Board on the May 6, 2010 Board Meeting.

Professional Development

To realize the vision of Sacramento City Unified School District, which is to fully prepare all students for college and career, it is imperative that the district provides numerous opportunities to expand the professional repertoire of its administrators and teachers.

To that end, the district has crafted a high quality professional program that is focused on Literacy (including ELA Common Core Standards), English Language Learners, Differentiation of Instruction, Data Inquiry, Culturally and Linguistically Teaching and Learning, and Conceptual Understanding of Mathematics. These areas of focus were derived from needs assessments coupled with the analysis of student learning of specific content and that is ongoing with follow-up opportunities, models effective practices, and uses assessments to guide and monitor progress. The learning opportunities afforded through this program deeply align with the needs of our individual schools, as well as our strategic plan, and connect to every aspect of school

practice: thinking curriculum, intentional instructional practices, assessment for learning, and lesson design.

These learning experiences, which are offered during the school day, after-school, as well as on Saturdays, and are supported with on-site coaching, are in addition to the required 18-hours of professional development designated for teachers to engage in collaborative professional learning at their respective school sites. Such communities of practices, under the leadership and guidance of site administrators, afford our teachers the opportunity to deepen their content knowledge, strengthen their instructional repertoire, improve their assessment strategies, and foster a shared sense of responsibility. As a result, every teacher will help to promote and nurture a community of learners in which the individual school staff is not only enriched, but the district as a whole is enhanced.

Student Performance

The Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) Program consists of several key components, including:

- California Standards Tests (CSTs), which include English-language arts (ELA) and mathematics in grades two through eleven; science in grades five, eight, and nine through eleven; and history-social science in grades eight, and nine through eleven.
- California Modified Assessment (CMA), an alternate assessment that is based on modified achievement standards in ELA for grades three through eleven; mathematics for grades three through seven, Algebra I, and Geometry; and science in grades five and eight, and Life Science in grade ten. The CMA is designed to assess those students whose disabilities preclude them from achieving grade-level proficiency on an assessment of the California content standards with or without accommodations.
- California Alternate Performance Assessment (CAPA), includes ELA and mathematics in grades two through eleven, and science for grades five, eight, and ten. The CAPA is given to those students with significant cognitive disabilities whose disabilities prevent them from taking either the CSTs with accommodations or modifications or the CMA with accommodations.

The assessments under the STAR Program show how well students are doing in relation to the state content standards. On each of these assessments, student scores are reported as performance levels.
